The negative consequences of climate change are not distributed evenly. Girls are frequently the first to drop out of school to help their families earn money, do household chores, or care for their brothers and sisters. They are less likely to learn about climate change.

Contributing to the widening of gender inequalities, and lacking the knowledge to engage in climate change responses.



The positive relationship between climate change and girls' education is that it has the potential to provide girls with the skills, knowledge, and critical thinking needed to engage in appropriate climate change responses and solutions, paving the way for a more environmentally responsible society.

When all women and girls have equal access to education and resources, they can become powerful advocates for climate action.


Girls are more likely to go hungry and will often eat the least and last, leading to hunger and malnutrition.
